## Greetings to the Associates of Oita Across the Globe

New Year's Greetings from Nakashima Eiji, Director to the Planning Promotion Department, Oita Prefecture

Happy new year.

During last year's Rugby World Cup 2019 period, Oita hosted 5 matches including 2 quarterfinals, in which a total of 173 thousand spectators attended the games at the stadium. Other than South Africa, the remainder of the best four teams - England, New Zealand and Wales - put on world-level performances here at Oita. Primary school students and other citizens alike engaged in welcoming ceremonies such as national anthem recitals and commemorative photography with guests. Local senior high school students in particular interacted regularly with visitors through rugby-related events and school visits. On top of this, citizens mingled with circles of overseas guests in fanzones and tourist attractions, stepping out of their comfort zones through participating in challenging roles such as tour guides so as to engage in more proactive communication.



Moving onto tourism, for the first time in history, Oita topped the national ranking in the 'Overall Satisfaction Level at the Completion of the Journey' category in Jalan's Travel and Boarding Analysis 2019. Furthermore, according to the Japan Tourism Agency's figures in 2018, foreign tourists alone have spent over a record-breaking 1.4 million guest nights in local accommodation facilities; factor in Japanese visitors, and the figure reaches a never-before-seen 7.77 million guest nights. *(Continued on next page)*

The Olympic flame will be passed around the prefecture between 24~25 April, and we are hoping that this will add momentum to the big event. # Scorching the Winter Skies

### Beppu Christmas Hanabi Fantasia

Every year, on the weekend of Christmas or the one that falls before it, the night sky above Beppu Bay is illuminated by the light of firework displays. The evenings of 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> last December saw the convention of the Beppu Christmas Hanabi Fantasia 2019. I attended on the second evening, and as the starting time approached, swarms of people began arriving the Matogahama Park where the fireworks are set offshore. While the seaside park is the viewing location of choice, I chose to watch from the rooftop carpark of YouMe Town Beppu, another location mapped on the event's official flyer. It had rained throughout the day, and while the sky cleared up just before the display, the wind was chilly so finding the courage to press the shutter proved to be quite challenging. Despite this, the ground shimmered like a mirror thanks to the rain and the city of Beppu shone twice as brilliantly from the incandescence of the fireworks.

Not far off from the firework barges stands the Beppu Tower. Completed in 1957, the Beppu Tower is designed by the late architect and engineer Naito Tachu who is renowned as a pioneer in earthquakeproof designs. Naito built many broadcasting and observation towers around Japan – alongside the Nagoya TV Tower, the Tsutengaku, the Sapporo TV Tower, the Tokyo Tower and the Hakata Port Tower, the Beppu Tower was built in the 1950~60s of postwar Japan and the towers are collectively dubbed the 'Six Tower Brothers'. While not tall by modern standards, the Beppu Tower still stands proudly like a candle shedding light over the city to this day. Around me were young families who had also come to enjoy the lightshow, and somewhere nearby a dog howled as the fireworks crackled above. Even if you don't celebrate Christmas, soaking up the atmosphere of the festival and looking at the night scenery of Beppu is quite enjoyable in itself.
